

# Alcmeonis: genealogical tables (partly conjectural)

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## THE 'NORM OF THE POLYP', THE ALCMEONIS AND THE ORACLE OF AMPHIARAUS

## 1) Pindar fr. 43a Maehler

ὧ τέχνον, ποντίου θηρὸς πετραίου χρωτὶ μάλιστα νόον προσφέρων πάσαις πολίεσσιν ὁμίλει· τῷ παρεόντι δ' ἐπαινήσαις ἐχών ἄλλοτ' ἀλλοῖα φρόνει.

O son, make your mind most like the skin of the rocky sea creature in all the cities you visit; readily praise the person who is present, but think differently at other times. (tr. W.H. Race).

1-5 Athenaeus 12.513c: τοιοῦτός ἐστι καὶ ὁ παραινῶν ᾿Αμφιλόχῷ τῷ παιδί΄...

## **2) Theognidean Sylloge, 213-218, part. 215-217** (cf. also 1071-1074)

πουλύπου ὀργὴν ἴσχε πολυπλόκου, ὃς ποτὶ πέτρῃ, τῆ προσομιλήσῃ, τοῖος ἰδεῖν ἐφάνη· νῦν μὲν τῆδ' ἐφέπου, τότε δ' ἀλλοῖος χρόα γίνου.

Adopt the mood of the cunning octopus which seems to resemble the rock to which it clings. Now follow along in this direction, now take on a different complexion (tr. D.E. Gerber).

# 3) Fragmentum Epicum Adespotum ('Homerus' fr. 3 Davies; *Thebais* fr. 4 Bernabé = 8\* West)

πουλύποδός μοι, τέκνον, ἔχων νόον, 'Αμφίλοχ' ήρως, τοῖσιν ἐφαρμόζειν, τῶν κεν κατὰ δῆμον ἵκηαι, ἄλλοτε δ' ἀλλοῖος τελέθειν καὶ χροιῆ ἕπεσθαι.

Pray hold to the octopus' outlook, Amphilochus my son, and adapt it to whatever people you come among; be changeable, and go along with the color. (tr. M.L. West)

#### 4) Pausanias 5.17.7

#### 5) Apollodorus 3.7.2 = *Alcmeonis* fr. °11 Bernabé

Having chosen Alcmaeon as their leader, they made war on Thebes. The men who took part in the expedition were these: Alcmaeon and Amphilochus, sons of Amphiaraus (Αλκμαίων καὶ ἀμφίλοχος ἀμφιαράου); Aegialeus, son of Adrastus; Diomedes, son of Tydeus; Promachus, son of Parthenopaeus; Sthenelus, son of Capaneus; Thersander, son of Polynices; and Euryalus, son of Mecisteus. # 6) Strabo 10.2.26; 7.7.7 = Ephorus FGrHist 70 F 123a-b = Alcm. fr. °9 [I-II] Bernabé

Ephorus, then, makes Acarnania subject to Alcmaeon even before the Trojan War; and he not only declares that the Amphilochian Argos was founded by him, but also says that Acarnania was named after Alcamaeon's son Acarnan, and the Amphilochians after Alcmaeon's brother Amphilochus (ἀπὸ τοῦ ἀδελφοῦ ἀμφιλόχου).

Alcmaeon stayed in Acarnania, founded Argos, and named it Amphilochicum after his brother (ἐπώνυμον τοῦ ἀδελφοῦ). (tr. H.L. Jones)

## 7) Pindar, Pythian 8.38-55

... you earn the very words which Oikles' son once spoke in riddles as he beheld the sons standing firm in battle at seven-gated Thebes,

when the Epigonoi came from Argos
on a second expedition.
Thus he spoke as they fought:
'By nature the noble resolve from fathers
shines forth in their sons. I clearly see
Alkman wielding the dappled serpent on his flashing
shield in the forefront at the gates of Kadmos.

But he who suffered in a former defeat,
the hero Adrastos,
is now met with news
of better omen, but in his own household
he will fare otherwise: for he alone from the Danaan army
will gather the bones of his dead son and with the favor
of the gods will come with his host unharmed

to the spacious streets of Abas". (tr. W.H. Race)
