399, shortly before Socrates' trial and death, at the King's Stoa

Subject

What is piety?

Important figures

Socrates
Euthyphro (his own father's prosecutor)
Meletus (Socrates' prosecutor)

Development of the Dynamic between Euthyphro, Socrates, and Meletus

- Euthyphro aligns himself with Socrates as Socrates describes his court case
- Socrates gently distinguishes his work from Euthyphro's.
- Euthyphro describes his case; as a prosecutor, he is clearly distinguished from Socrates, and implicitly compared to Meletus.
- Socrates asks Euthyphro to defend him in court, seemingly placing Meletus and Euthyphro in opposition to one another.
- This apparent opposition openly invites comparison between the two men of who would win in court; this comparison shows that the two men are more alike than they are different.
